

1892 - East School building completed.


1954 - New school built at 751 East 4th St. and moved into. Elementary grades remained at the old location for some time.

His elaborate home under a later ownership was placed in receivership and purchased by John Deffenbaugh; Lee and Belle Slusser; Building was razed by Marathon Oil Co.; Bing and Rosey's Marathon Service Station, Richard "Bing" Croy and Howard "Rosey" Rosenbarger; Other Marathon lessees unknown; Gastown; Rich Oil.





Current Court House erected 1909 - 1913


245 East Main St. - COURTHOUSE
Kalida was designated as the first County Seat in 1829. In 1835 the Kalida
Courthouse was constructed of logs, later replaced by one of brick. In
December, of 1864 the building was destroyed by a disastrous fire in
which many valuable records were lost. Great controversy raged over the
proposal to move the county seat to Ottawa where railroads were being
built. In 1865, the Legislature of State authorized an election. A majority
of votes for Ottawa resulted in the removal. The first courthouse in
Ottawa was constructed of red brick, completed in 1868 and used until
1912 when the present building with its marble floors and balustrades
was erected.


Ghost of Courthouse Past



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


