1948 President Truman Whistle Stop tour



President Harry S. Truman was given a cordial reception by a large and enthusiastic audience when his special train stopped in Ottawa for eight minutes Monday afternoon at two-forty o'clock.

Estimates of the number of persons who lined both sides of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad between Main and Third streets ranged from a conservative 3500 to more than 6000. 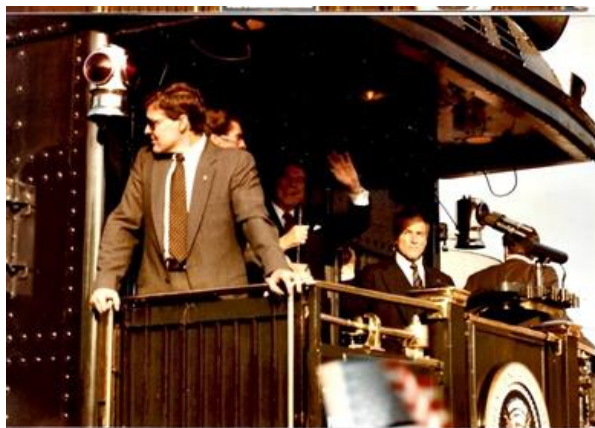
